Exploring Watercolor and self care

"Paint for Peace, Not Perfection"

Materials: (video 1)

- □ Watercolor paper (90+lbs)
- Medium round watercolor brush
- Watercolor paint
- Flat pans
- Water to blend
- Water for cleaning brush
- Paper towel

Additional Materials Needed

- Drawing pencils
- Color pencils
- Permanent Marker

Tip: Your paper will curl up as it gets wet. You may need to let it dry and then put pressure on it.

Technique: (<u>video 2</u>)

- 1. Load your brush with water, tap excess off.
- 2. Load color from tray, tap and stroke color on flat pan/tray.
- 3. Apply paint to the paper:
 - a. Experiment with long and short strokes.
 - b. Experiment with holding the brush at different angles.
- 4. Add water to dilute the color.
 - a. More water = Lighter color
- 5. Clean brush before changing color.
- 6. If your stroke feels dry, add water.
- 7. If your stroke feels bland, add color.

Brainstorming: How can we use art elements and principles to express emotions? How does material/medium choice affect artistic expression?

Elements of Art: Those components that make up a composition: line, value, space, texture, shape/form and color.

Principles of Design: The way the elements of art such as balance, movement, pattern/repetition, unity/variety and emphasis are used to create a composition.

Guided Practice: How is art used as a tool? Practice different strokes of the brush while listening to music for 5-10 minutes.

How do you feel after this activity? What kind of music did you listen to? What does your art look like?

Activity:

- 1. Choose a lyric or set of lyrics from a song that are meaningful to you.
- 2. Make a **4-9 square set of thumbnail sketches** (1 page) of a composition that portrays the lyrics you chose.
 - a. This is a good time to sketch out thumbs for multiple lyrics if your heart isn't set one a particular choice yet.
 - Be considerate of where your song title and lyrics will go in the composition.
 You may use a block or line as a space saver.
- 3. <u>Fold your paper in half</u> we are making a <u>greeting card</u>. **Draft a full composition on the front cover** that showcases those lyrics. *Give credit to the band/artist(s) and provide the title of the song on your sketch.
- 4. Use your completed draft to start **your final artwork**. Finish details with color pencils and markers as needed.
- 5. Take pictures and make a **process board** so we can see your techniques and choices in material.
- 6. When you are done, write yourself a message on the inside of the card.
- 7. Create a Google Doc or Google Slide Presentation of your final work with a title page for a quick critique next class.



Taking different angled images close-up can help your viewer see finer details they may have missed while observing the artwork as a whole image from a distance.

Your Final Presentation Document

Students will present a digital document (Google Slides or Doc)

- 1. Include a **title page** with student name, class, title for the project/artwork, and subtitle of "Watercolor".
- 2. Include thumbnail sketches (4-9 images on 1 page).
- 3. Include draft of composition (1 page).
- 4. Include process board images in this document (up to 2 pages).
- 5. Include the final image. *Multiple views are encouraged.
 - a. One full page image of the final.
 - b. Up to one additional page of close-up images for detail.

We will have a quick informal critique/presentation during our next class.
